Why: JFK did not commit the Navy to bail out "Bay of Pigs" invasion.

Why: JFK did not bomb the missile sites in Cuba.

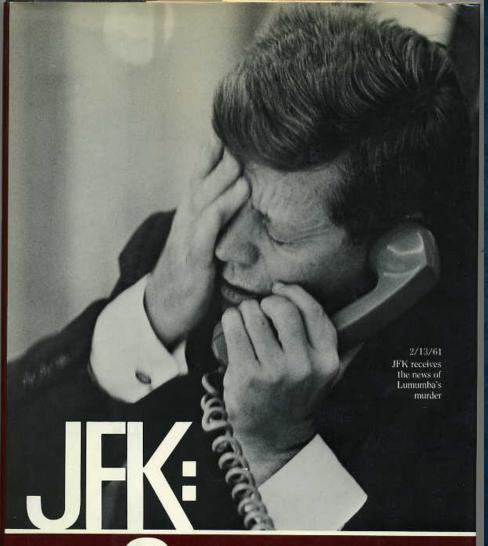
I had a small part in that since I wrote a sidebar which compared the policies of Eisenhower, Kennedy and Johnson towards Sukarno.

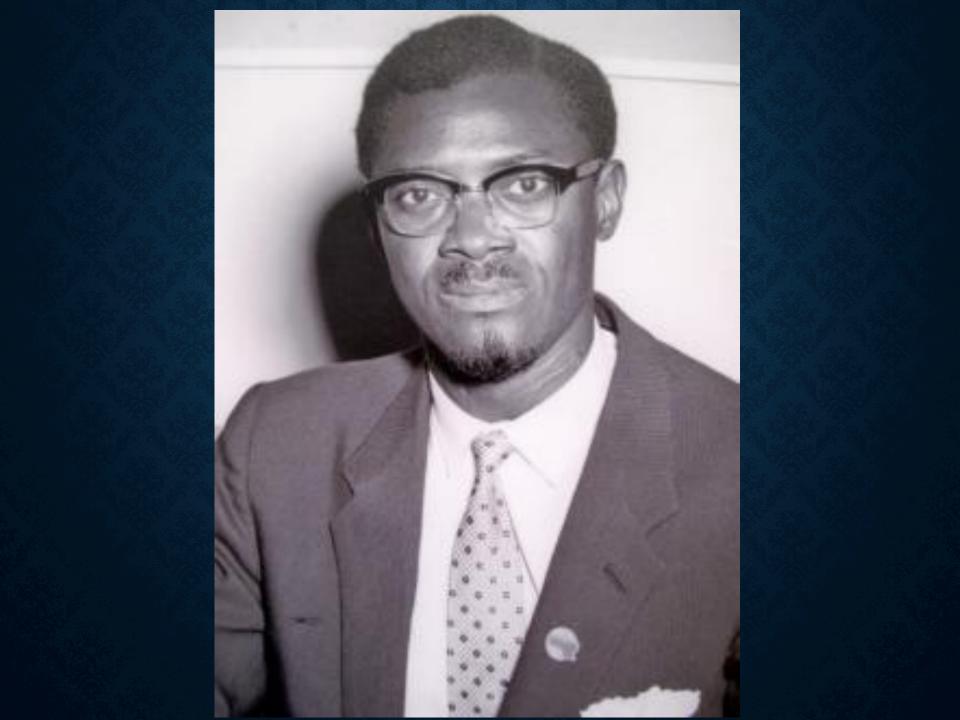
Was everyone missing something? But I still had not connected the dots yet.

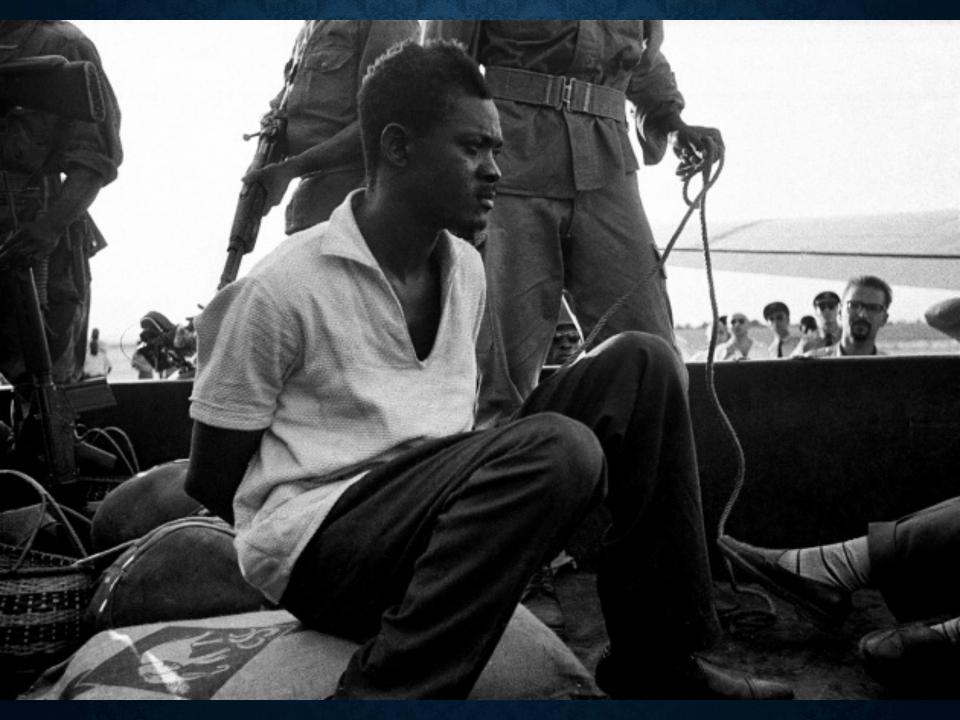

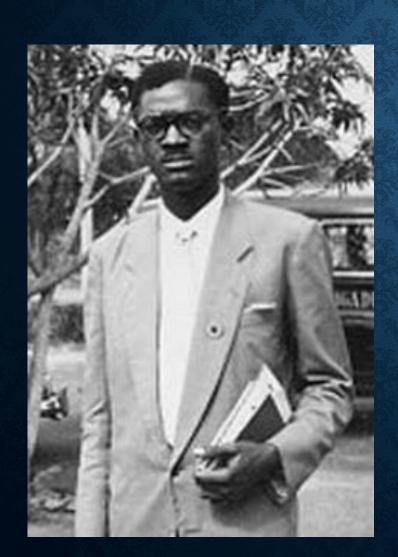






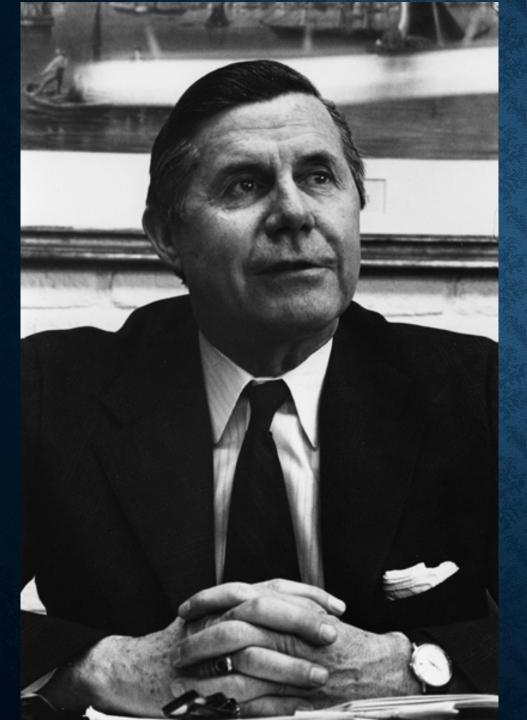

Gullion changed JFK's foreign policy forever

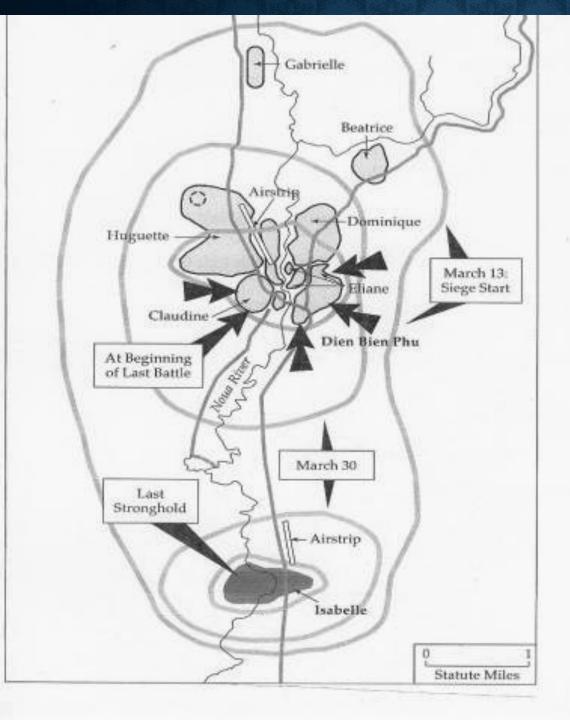

Foster Dulles puts together a plan to lift the siege of Dien Bien Phu.

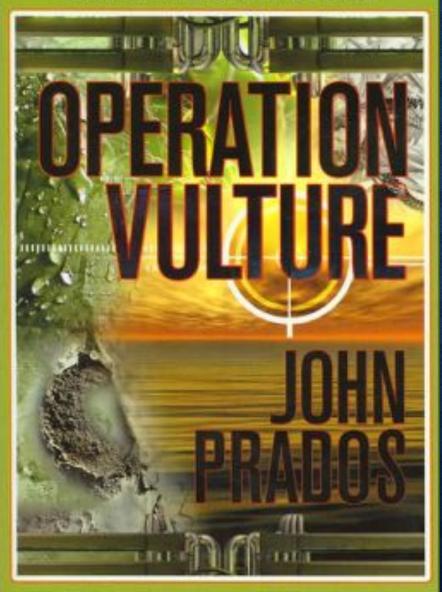


General Giap had encircled the isolated French position in North Vietnam.

60 B-29s bomb Giap's army around Dien Bien Phu

Approved by Foster Dulles and Admiral Radford

Ultimately vetoed by Eisenhower when he could not get England to back him on it.

Senator Kennedy reacts to Vulture:

"How will the new Dulles policy and its threat of atomic retaliation fare in an area of guerilla warfare."

Senator Kennedy reacts to Vulture:

"No amount of American military assistance can conquer an enemy which is everywhere and nowhere and has the sympathy and support of the people."

This is the same message President Kennedy will use in 1961 to argue against sending combat troops to Vietnam.

1956: JFK Campaigns for Stevenson:

"The Afro-Asian revolution of nationalism, the revolt against colonialism. . .in my opinion, the tragic failure of both Republican and Democratic administrations since World War II to comprehend the nature of this revolution... Has reaped a bitter harvest today. It is a major foreign policy issue that has nothing to do with anti-Communism."

1956: Stevenson to JFK:
Knock it off! Please do not make any more foreign policy statements in any way associated with my campaign.

If Sen. Kennedy's 1954 Operation Vulture speech was his first defining moment--

Kennedy's 2nd Defining Moment:

1957: JFK attacks Eisenhower and Dulles in the Senate.

The great Algeria Speech

ALGERIA

By 1957 France had committed 500,000 troops to suppress a nationalist rebellion.

It devolved into torture, atrocity and terror on both sides.

As horror became exposed, it caused the fall of Fourth Republic and the rise to power of Charles DeGaulle.

Kennedy's Algeria Speech July 2, 1957

"Should we antagonize our French allies over Algeria? The most important reason we have sided with the French in Algeria and North Africa is our reluctance to antagonize a traditional friend and important ally in her hour of crisis."

"Yet, did we not learn in Indochina, where we delayed action as the result of similar warnings, that we might have served both the French and our own causes infinitely better had we taken a firm stand earlier than we did? Did that tragic episode not teach us that, whether France likes it or not...their overseas territories are sooner or later inevitably going to break free and look with suspicion on the Western nations who impeded their steps to independence." "The problem is to save the French nation, as well as to free Africa."

"In these days, we can help fulfill a great and promising opportunity to show the world that a new nation, with an Arab heritage, can establish itself in the Western tradition and successfully withstand both the pull toward Arab feudalism and fanaticism and the pull toward communist authoritarianism."

(This theme of moderating Arab nationalism will be acted upon when Kennedy enters office)



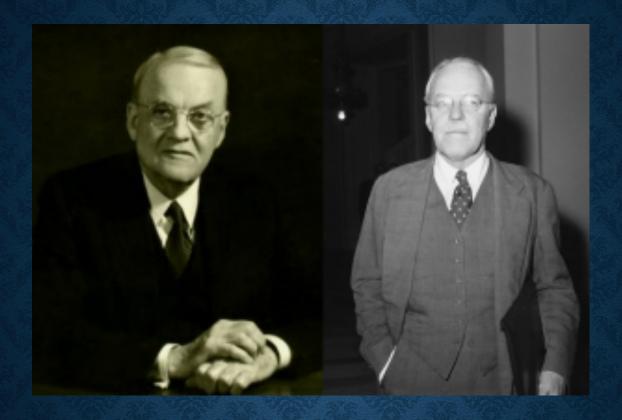
All three members of the White House foreign policy team attacked Kennedy for making the speech: Eisenhower, John Foster Dulles, and Richard Nixon.

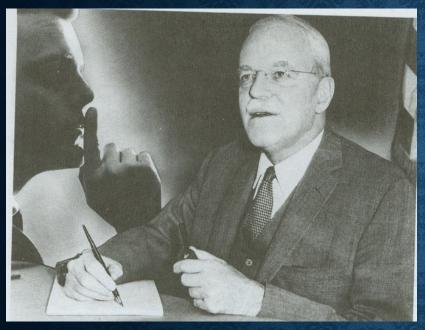
Founded in 1879.

Thomas Cromwell participated in the heist of the Panama Canal from Colombia in 1903.

John Foster Dulles joined the firm in 1911.



By 1915, Foster Dulles was doing intelligence work for the State Department in Latin America.



1953: Dulles became CIA Director.

Since Allen and Foster were corporate lawyers, the CIA now came to mean "Corporate Interests of America".



Like his mentor, David Rockefeller, Allen Dulles was a globalist.

Kennedy never liked David Rockefeller's globalist plans.

It took a Republican like Clinton to get them finalized.

Kennedy in 1961: reversals of Dulles' policies

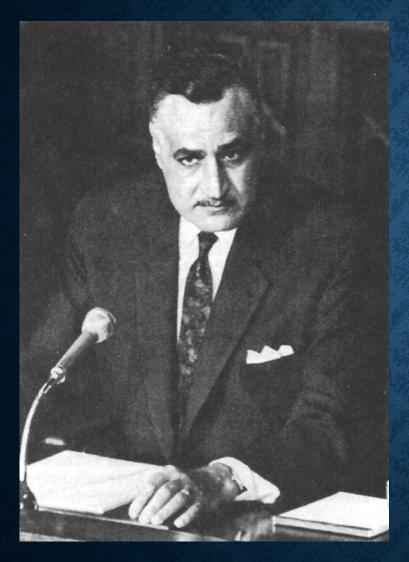


In 1961, Kennedy cooperates with Hammarskjold to neutralize Congo and keep European imperialism out. After he was killed, Kennedy carried the burden alone for more than 2 years.



Foster Dulles killed the US relationship with Nasser. Decided to back the monarchy in Saudia Arabia against Nasser.

Kennedy reversed his policy and actually backed Nasser's importation of troops into the Yemen civil war.



Kennedy perceived Nasser and Sadat as the best hopes of harnessing Arab nationalism in a direction of progress and democracy, avoiding the extremes of monarchy and religious fanaticism.



Kennedy also opposed the Dulles intervention in Lebanon in 1958 to back a Christian pro-west leader.

Kennedy commissioned a State Department study of the costs and liabilities of returning Mossadegh to power in Iran.

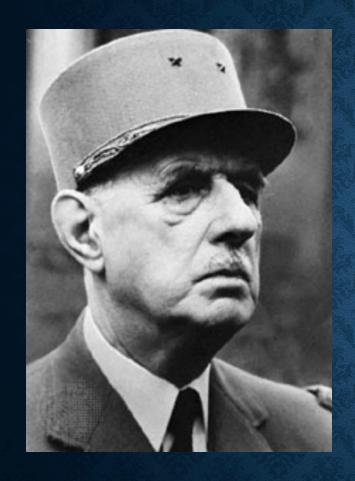


Antonio Salazar, Portugal

Kennedy determined to get European powers out of Africa.

Offered Salazar of Portugal the equivalent of 16 billion dollars (today) to set free Mozambique and Angola.

When Portugal refused, JFK sent aid to the rebels in each country.



Kennedy risked relations with France over Africa also.

November 1963, study made to find countermeasures to ways in which DeGaulle was keeping Francophone Africa under his influence.



Kennedy risked relations with Netherlands over Indonesia.

Dulles brothers tried to overthrow Sukarno in 1958.

They would not help Sukarno secure West Irian from the Netherlands.

JFK negotiated the return of West Irian to Indonesia.

Lessons from Gullion

US could compete with Russia in the non-aligned sphere.

Kennedy would not commit troops into the Third World—especially in lost causes of Cuba and Vietnam.

Not all nationalist leaders are communists.

Lessons from Gullion

As McGeorge Bundy said to Marcus Raskin, "There are two pacifists in the White House, you and Kennedy."

CIA & LBJ Overturn JFK's Policies

Within 18 months of his death:

American combat troops are in Vietnam.

Cuban exiles are flying missions to kill the last of Lumumba's followers.

Sukarno is overthrown and the Communist Party of Indonesia is decimated.

This story is repeated in Dominican Republic, Brazil, and Laos.

Power Elite Gains from JFK's Death

To use just one example: Grasberg Mine in West Irian

Today owned not by Indonesia, but by Freeport McMoran, an American corporation.

In 2006, 2.5 billion in gold, 150 million in silver, and 50 million in copper was extracted.

People in Third World Understood What Happed to Kennedy

In 1964 the ambassador to Ghana presented the Warren Report to Kwame Nkrumah.

Upon opening it and pointing to the name of Allen Dulles, he said one word: "Whitewash."

JFK's response to Nehru:

"I grew up in a community where the people were hardly a generation away from colonial rule. And I can claim the company of many historians in saying that the colonialism to which my immediate ancestors were subject was more sterile, oppressive and even cruel than that of India."

John F. Kennedy fired Allen Dulles in 1961, ending an intelligence career that had gone back for four decades.
